


The New York Society of Model Engineers was founded in 1926 to provide a central meeting place where those interested in all phases of model making could meet with others interested in the same or kindred subjects to exchange views and information.

Although most of the men who formed the Society were interested in some type of boat modeling, the major interest has shifted to model railroading to such an extent that many people assume that the Society is only a model railroad group. While the majority of the members are model railroaders, there is still a large group of members interested in model racing hydroplanes together with smaller groups interested in live steam locomotives, stationary engines, architectural models, model planes and many other phases of model making. It is hoped that the interest in these other fields of model building will be expanded until there is no one major group in the Society.

Membership in the N.Y.S.M.E. is open to mature minded model makers, twenty-one years of age or older, who are vitally interested in any field of model making and who can devote some of their time to the practical benefit of the Society. The fees are nominal with a \$5.00 initiation fee and \$10.00 annual dues. Should you care to join the Society, additional details and information can be obtained at the office or from any member.

New members can find experts in almost every branch of model making, ready and willing to help solve their particular problem. The accumulated experience and knowledge of the members represents one of the Society's most valuable assets.

The tools in the shop of the Society are available to qualified members without any additional obligation.

The officers and members of the Society extend a hearty welcome to those visiting our show on this occasion of our 20th Anniversary. We hope your visit will give you an insight into what model makers are accomplishing. We have attempted to assemble the best models from every field for your inspection.

THE UNION CONNECTING RAILROAD

The present Union Connecting Railroad is the third model railroad system of the New York Society of Model Engineers to bear that well known name which was chosen because equipment and rolling stock from every representative railroad in the country may be seen operating over its tracks.

This UCON is a completely newly designed system since there is not sufficient area in our new quarters to reestablish the old layout. It is almost impossible for those not familiar with model railroading to realize the amount of work involved in the design and construction of a system such as the UCON. Our experience has indicated that approximately 10,000 man hours work are required for each 100 feet of completed track in a model railroad. Our reconstruction program was further complicated by the fact that this work all had to be done in war time with its consequent shortage of materials and supplies and when the Society was handicapped by lack of sufficient manpower. For these reasons every effort was made to utilize as much as possible of the old UCON in the design and construction of this new and improved railroad system.

Although there is very little scenery on this new railroad and the intricate signaling and control systems, which our visitors have come to expect to see on the UCON, have not as yet been installed we still take pardonable pride in the system now in operation. We are sure you will agree with us when you learn that actual construction on this new railroad system could not be started until August 1945.

The new Union Connecting Railroad is quite different from its two predecessors both of which were single track railroads. Being single track roads, movement of traffic was restricted over much of the previous systems. The new railroad, however, consists of a double track main line from the main terminal at Waverly to the secondary terminal at Elliot Park with a return loop in each terminal. In addition there is the single track Argyle Branch from Waverly to Elliot Park via Kingston and the single track Logan Branch from Waverly to Kingston. The use of the double track main line will permit much freer movement of traffic in both directions and the two branch lines will carry any overload with ease.

We hope you will watch the growth and improvement in this new Union Connecting Railroad as you have its two forebears. 



MARINE ACTIVITIES

The Marine activities of the New York Society of Model Engineers, like all other activities of the Society, were very much handicapped and curtailed by the move of the Society to its new quarters. It is hoped, however, that the activities of this group will rebound now that we are well settled in our new quarters and members are returning from overseas.

Most of the members of the Marine group which is the oldest organized group in the Society build miniature racing hydroplanes. These boats which are powered by miniature internal combustion or steam engines are raced against time over a circular course created by tethering the boat to a pole by a 52½ foot standard stainless steel line.

Miniature power boating has taken phe-

nominal strides since it was begun in England about 1910. The speed of these boats has been increased from an actual speed of about 5 miles an hour to an actual speed of about 70 miles an hour just before the war. It would be necessary for real racing boats, such as were driven by Gar Wood, to be driven at a speed of about 500 miles per hour to attain a comparable record. It is expected that recent engineering development in the design of motors and in fuels used, which have been a result of the war, will soon see even these phenominal records eclipsed.
