BY-LAWS OF THE NEW YORK SOCIETY OF MODEL ENGINEERS.

The Constitution of the New York Society of Model Engineers provides for the functioning of the Society in general, and, to some degree, for the duties of the Officials of the Society and how the business of the Society shall be conducted.

These by-laws do not in any way infringe upon the Constitution, but are drawn up to govern the routine and general fundationing of the Society.

ARTICLE I. Meetings and Dues

Sec. 1. The General Meetings of the Society are those meetings in which all members and guests of the Society participate in. They are held monthly as stated in Sec. 1. Art. V of the Constitution. of the Society.

Sec. 2. The Executive Committee Meetings are those meetings which are held by the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall convene upon the first Tuesdays of the following months, namely, January, March, May, September, and November

Sec. 3. The Executive Board meetings are those meetings held by the Executive Board. The Executive Board shall convene upon the first Tuesday of the following months, namely, January, May, September and November.

Sec. 4. When the Executive Committee and the Executive Board convene upon the same date, the Executive Committee shall be called to order first and when all of its business has been transacted, the Executive Committee shall adjourn. Upon this action the Executive Board shall then convene and be called to order.

Sec. 5. A general meeting of the Society may be called at the request of the Executive Board at any other time than that stated in Sec. 1. of this Article.

Sec. 6. At the request of the Chairman or Executive Officer, of this Society, the Executive Committee may be called upon to convene at any time other than that stated in Sec. 2. of this Article

Sec. 7. The Executive Board may be called upon to convene at the request of the Executive Committee, or by a petition of at least one half of the members of the Society at any

at least one half of the members of the Society at any time other than that stated in Sec. 3. of this Article.

Sec. 8. The dues to this Society shall be five dollars per annum, and, in the case of new members there shall be an additional fee of five dollars as per Sec. 2, Art. II of the Constitution of the Society.

Paragraph a. Any prospective member or applicant for membership to this Society, upon being elected a member of this Society at any time or at any of the stated meetings between the months of April to January

inclusive, shall pay the full year's dues in addition to the fee mentioned in this section of this article

Any prospective member or applicant for Paragraph b. membership to this Society, upon being e elected a member of the Society at any time or at any of the stated meetings of the Society between the months of January to April, inclusive, shall pay one half of a year's dues in addition to the fee mentioned in Sec. 8 of this Article.

ARTICLE II. Proceedure to be maintained at the General Meetings, Executive Board Meetings and Executive Committee Meetings

Sec. 1. The proceedure for the Executive Committee meetings

f. Adjournment. The proceedure for the Executive Board Meetings

a. Meeting called to order. b. Passing upon transactions or business left over from the previous meeting of the Executive Board. c. New business. Adjournment.

Sec. 3. The proceedure of the General Meetings of the Society are provided for in Sec. 4. Art. V of the Constitution of the Society.

The proceedures mentioned in sections 1 to 3 of this article hold for all meetings whethersspecial or regular.

ARTICLE III Duties of the Executive Board, Executive Committee

The duties of the Executive Board are advisory and are clearly stated in Sec. 3 Art. IV of the Consti-

tution of the Society.

Sec. 2. The duties of the Executive Committee are stated in Sec. 2. Art. IV of the Constitution of the Society, and, in addition thereto, assume all moral obligations for transacting all business for the Society.

The duties of the Officials of the Society have been stated in Sec. 2 Art. V of the Constitution of the Society and in addition thereto, they assume the following duties other than those stated in the Constitution of the Society

The Chairman of the Society shall preside at all the meetings of the General Society and at all of the Executive Board Meetings. b. The Executive Officer in addition to the duties pertaining to that office shall assume the office of Secretary to the Executive Board.

c. The Marine Secretary in addition to the duties pertaining to that office, shall assume the effice of Secretary to the Executive Committee. d. The duties of the General Secretary, Recording Secretary and Treasurer are those

commonly pertaining to their offices
e. In the event of the absence of the Chairman of the Society, the Executive Officer assumes
the office of Chairman of the Society, and if
the absence be continued without excuse or
reason, shall assume the office of Chairman for

the unexpired term of office.

f. In the event stated in part e of this section and Article, the Recording Secretary becomes Chairman. The General Secretary becomes Recording Secretary. The Marine Secretary becomes the General Secretary The Treasurer continues in office and the office of Marine Secretary becomes open for appointment.

g. In the event of the absence of the Recording Secretary, and, if this absence becomes continued without excuse or reason, the General Secretary becomes the Recording Secretary. The Marine Secretary becomes the General Secretary. The Treasurer continues in office, and the office of Marine Secretary becomes open for appointment.

ARTICLE IV. Records.
Sec. 1. The Constitution of the Society provides in Sec
5 and 6 of Article V of the Constitution of the

kept.

This section means that complete transactions records and proceedures, etc of the General Meetings, Executive Board, Executive Committee and other special committees appointed by the Executive Board must be kept.

The Chairman of the Society must present to the Executive Board at its January Meeting a report of his utive Board at its January Meeting a report of his activities covering the period from his election to activities covering the period from his election to office up to and including January first of each office up to and including January first of each office up to and including January be filed, if nevert A supplementary report may be filed, if never the period from the first of January to the first of April.

a. After this report is approved of by the Executive Board, it is placed before the members of the Society at the General Meeting of the Society in April. And this

report, after having passed upon at the General Meeting in April is to be filed in the Minutes, Records and Proceedures of the Society.

Sec. 3. The Chairman's report shall incorporate in it the reports of the Executive Officer, Recording Secretary, General Secretary, Marine Secretary and Treasurer to the Chairman of the Society.

Sec. 4. The Minute Book of the Society shall be kept up to date.

Sec. 5. The Treasurer must keep a set of Books in balance and posted up to date.

Sec. 6. All books and records of the Society shall be open for inspection at any time upon the demand of any member of the Society or Official of the Society. or at the demand of the Executive Board and Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V. Authority and Penalties.

Sec. 1. No official of the Society, ie, the Recording Secretary, General Secretary, Marine Secretary or Treasurer will act or perform his duties without proper authorization from the Executive Board.

Sec. 2. The Chairman is answerable to the Executive Board for his acts.

Sec. 3. The Executive officer is answerable to the Chairman and the Executive Board for his acts.

Sec. 4. Any official mentioned in Sec. 1. of this Article refusing to obey the orders of the Executive Board, Chairman or Executive Officer shall be deemed to be in contempt and is subject to reprimand by the Executive Board,

Sec. 5. Any Official after having been reprimanded three times by the Executive Board is liable to suspension.

Sec. 6. The Executive Board shall have the power to remove an official of the Society from office, if due and sufficient charges be brought against that official.

Sec. 7. All charges against an official of the Society must be drawn up in the form of an affidavit, signed and sworn to and presented to the Executive Board for action.

Sec. 8. Any official so accused as per sec 6 & 7 of this article has the right to defend himself.

Sec. 9. Upon the conviction of any official of the Society of any charges brought against him, the Executive Board shall have the power to suspend him from membership or take any other action which they may deem fit and proper.

Sec. 10. The failure to keep records, minutes and proceedures of the Society as provided in Sec 4 & 5 of Article IV. of this set of by-laws shall be punishable as per sec. 4 to 7 inclusive of this article.

Sec. 11. Any member of the Society acting in a manner derogatory to the interests of the Society is liable to suspension by the Chairman and is subject to such penalties as the Executive Board may deem fit and proper.

The Treasurer of the Society shall receive a letter of authorization from the Executive Committee to be signed by all members of that committee for the expenditure of monies which are necessary and vital to the running of the Society and its endeavors.

All monies so expended must be accounted for by youchers which must be presented for approval at the next following meeting of the Executive Committee.
