REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE OFFICER OF THE NEW YORK SOCIETY OF MODEL ENGINEERS.


To the Chairman of The New York Society of Model Engineers,

It gives me great pleasure to make the report of my activities during the second term of office. Since my first report, I take great pleasure in saying that the Society has prospered in every respect. In every line of Model Engineering progress has been great. The Society has increased in Members and it is now on a sound financial basis.

During the year we have had two model power boat contests, an Exhibition, we have purchased a Multigraph, a set of by-laws has been written up, we have both a straight and portable test track and last but not least a copyrighted emblem and pins.

The Society's business and routine has been so conducted that it is costing each member about three and a quarter dollars per annum, which is not so bad when everything is taken into consideration. It is with this efficiency and economy that we have been able to keep our operating expenses so low. At the time of writing this report, we have no outstanding debts, nor nor are there any accounts receivable outstanding, except the Exhibition Deficit, which as has been pledged, will shortly be wiped out.

It is pleasing to note that our attendance has ancreased to a point which is almost double of what it was last year. A chart of the att andance for 1928-1929 has been complished by the master of Rolls, and same is attached hereto.

This I shall divide into two parts. The first as Marine Secretary, and secondly as the Publicity Manager.

The Marine Committee during the past year has done everything within its power to promote the general interest of the Society in the Races held during the Summer and in the Sunday Morning Meetings on Conservatory Lake.

There can hardly be any real report of work accomplished by the Marine Committee, owing to the fact that the work of the Marine Committee is largely made up of small tasks such as attending races, timing, keeping records of the time made upy the various boats, notifying members of the races and numerous other details.

The Publicity Committee during the past year has gotten out a series of twelve monthly letters of the general activities of the Society, which was mailed out to interested people, principally magazine editors.

It has also worked up a number of different ideas for Setting more publicity for the Society. At the present time these ideas are more or less up in the air, but during the coming year some of these will surely give definite results, notably advertising for future exhibits, and greater publicity for all



of the Society's activities.

## REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE NEW YORK SOCIETY OF MODEL ENGINEERS

To the Chairman of the New York Society of Model Engineers, Sir:

It is with pleasure that I make my second annual report, which I think will show that the Society is now upon a sound financial basis.

During 1928 and 1927, our total income was \$ 374.06 Our Expenditures during that period was S/ 306.71. Leaving a net cash balance on April first 1928 of \$ 67.35.

During the Same period of 1929-1928, our total income was \$ 939.90. Out total expenditures during this period amounted to \$ 780.62. Leaving a net cash balance of \$ 150.28 25. Or an increase of \$ 82.83.

During 1928-1929 the track fund balance remained the same. There were no expenses charged against maintaining the Portable Track.

The Emblems of the Society no longer are a burden to the Society, as the Die has long since been charged off, and the costs of purchasing new emblems are charged against the profits derived from the sale of previous emblems.

The Exhibition income was \$ 378.95. The total expenditures amounted to to \$ 402.83. Leaving a net deficit of \$ 23.88.

This deficit has already been pledged to be made up, and, ultimately the Society will have been broken even on the Exhibition costs.

The Books have been audited and were found to be in balance and in order at the close of our fiscal year.

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In October 1925, the Messers. A.A. and T.E.R. Singer held the first of a series of invitation meetings of enthusiasts in the art of Model Making, to which three or four of the most ardent enthusiasts attended in spite of inclement weather. The meeting place was a temporarily vacant office in 15 Moore street, New York City.

These meetings took place at rather irregular intervals but with constantly increasing attendance until at a meeting in April 1926 it was decided to organise somewhat more formally as a society to be known as The New York Society of Model Engineers. At the same time it was held best that the new society should be as free from unnecessary formalities and Parliamentary debating as possible, and that the officers should be only the minimum necessary for the handling of the society's affairs. To begin with it was decided to have a chairman and a secretary; the use of the term "President" was avoided. Mr. Walter Elliott who at the moment was occupying a chair behind a desk was elected chairman by acclamation, but later, owing to pressure of other affairs, Mr. Elliott felt obliged to resign in favour of Mr. Frank Pope, after the first meeting. Mr. A.A. Singer was elected secretary. The question of dues grose at this time, and the difficulty as to what use dues could be put, led to the decision to have nominal dues only, to cover the cost of postage in notifying members of the times of the meetings, and other incidental expenses.

Some of the meetings at this time were held under rather novel circumstances, in one instance without the benefit of chairs, the lecturer of the evening resting his foot on the Packing case on which his model was demonstrated, and the

audience standing around the walls of the room.

which then as now, constituted about half the membership, began holding meetings of its own between the regular monthly meetings of the Society. These meetings were, however, as a rule equally well attended by non-marine enthusiasts who could not wait a month for another meeting. These extra meetings were dropped after a while, but it was decided to have a marine secretary to look after the interests of this section of the club. The position was very ably filled by Mr. E.E. Thorp.

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Lectures of an informal kind were given on different subjects, though lecturers occasionally had to cope with a lack of complete attention on the part of the members. It has alaways been the case that most enjoyment is derived in comparing notes on model work of common interest, and so the greater part of each meeting was devoted to this purpose. Groups of members working on the same branch would quickly form.

were no longer available, and the January 1927 meeting was held by the kindness of Mr. J.T. Lozier at his apartment where the members had an opportunity of seeing Mr. Lozier's unique collection of models. This naturally could not be repeated the following month there was no meeting, the only time the meetings of the society have been interrupted since its inception, but in Mich of that year an emergency meeting was called at the Emgineering Societies building at 29 west 39 th. street. At this meeting it was decided by a large vote to increase the dues by the rather considerable amount necessary, to enable further meetings to be held in the Engineering Societies building. With the increase of responsibilities such an undertaking involved

Grimke was elected to the position of Treasurer, and also filled the newly created office of recording secretary; Mr. F.R. Pope became secretary in succession to Mr. T.E.R. Singer who had followed Mr. A.A. Singer in that position. Mr. Elliott was again elected Chairman. Provision was also made for the drawing up of a constitution and bye-laws, keeping in mind the original desire of the members for the avoidance of unnecessary formalities. A governing board was constituted, with an executive committee of the officers of the society.

The membership of the society has grown in the past two years from twenty odd members to over eighty, all active, and with an attendance of somewhat over half at each meeting. Three cup races have been held, in the Fall of 1926, '27 and '28, attracting great interest from the spectators in Central Park as well as gaining desirable publicity for the society; two Locomotive competitions have been held, bringing forth much excellent work, and various lesser competions have also been held at different times. The members have the use of circular and straight tracks of various gauges, and also of cars for weight hauling purposes.

From January 21 rst. to the 26th./the first of what is hoped will be annual exhibitions was held in the Bush Terminal Building at 130 West 42nd. street, and was largely attended by the public as well as by the members. It was estimated that between twentilve hundred and three thousand non-members attended, and had the exhibition explained by the members always in attendance.

Buesday, June 25th., 1939.

A General Meeting of the Society was held on the above date at the United Engineering Societies Building in New York City.

The Meeting was called to Irder by the Chairman.

It was announced from the Chair, that the Spring Race was postponed until July 21st. All Compeditors are to hand in their entry to Mr. Singer.

The Chairman tendered to Mr. Zimmer on behalf of the Members and Officials of the Society a public apology for the failure to accept Mr. Zimmer's kind invitation. The apology accepted and Mr. Herreschoff ventured to remark that he hoped the invitation would again be extended to the Society

The Financial Statement of the Society was read.

An An Amendment to the By-Laws was read. Action upon which will be taken in the September Meeting. A Copy of which is attached hereto.

An Analysis of the Membership of the Society was presented

Mr. Dobler proposed, and seconded by Mr. Bender that the Track Fund be cancelled and the surplus be thrown into the General Funds of the Society.

Mr. A. Bauer, Chairman of the Aviation Section announced that he would like to hear from any member interested in Model Aeroplanes. Mr. Singer was instructed to find out how many members of the Society are interested with a view of holding a meeting and further the interests of model aeroplanes.

As there was no further business to transact, the Meeting adjourned at 10.30 P. M.

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#### AMENDMENT TO BY\*LAWS

#### ARTICLE VIII.

- Sec. 1. The Following Committies shall be known as Standing Committies.
  - a. Membership Committee which shall be charged with the duty of interviewins Prospective Members to the Society and determine upon their fitness for same. They shall hold meetings at stated periods and shall pass upon the elegibility of Applicants for Membership. The Membership Committee will forward to the Board of Directors their findings for final action.
    - b. A Program Committee which shall be charged with the duty to provide and make arrangements for lectures, talks, outings, special features, etc which are given from time to time at the General Meetings of the Society.
    - c. A Publicity Committee which shall be charged with the duty of handling all of the Advertising and Publicity work necessary in the business routine of the Society.
  - Sec. 2. The Above Committees are supplemented by a Marine Committee and Railway Committee which shall take care of the interests in the Marine and Model Railway activities of the Society
  - Sec. 3. These Committies may be supplemented by other Special Committies as is needed. These Special Committies shall function in accordance and is provided for in the Constitution and By-laws of the Society.
  - Sec. 4. All Committees appointed in accordance with this Article of the By-Laws and the Constitution are appointed at the Discretion of the Chairman and Board of Directors of the Society.
  - Sec. 5. All Committies mentioned in this article are subject to the Penalties as mentioned in ART-ICLE V. of the By-LAWS.
  - Sec. 6. If for due and sufficient reasons any member of any Committee and any Committee may be discharged from further duty or functioning for due and sufficient causes or reasons at the request of the Executive Board.

A Meeting of the Executive Board and Executive Committee

All members of the Executive Committee were instructed to forward all vouchers and bills for payment on or before the fifth of the succeeding month to the Treasurer. Otherwise the bills will not be paid.

As there was no new business, the Executive Committee adjourned.

The Executive Board Convened.

The preliminary arrangements for the Exhibition were approved.

The Secretary was instructed to classify all members as to what they were interested in, so as to have this information for the Committee heads in forming Committees, etc.

Mr. R. H. Claudius was appointed head of the Locomotive Committee. Mr. F. C. Zimmer was appointed head of the Marine Committee and Mr. A. Bauer was appointed to take charge of the Aeronautic Section of the Society.

The Exhibition Committee will be appointed within a week at the discretion of the Executive Board.

The Executive Officer was instructed to make up an Organization Chart.

The General Secretary was instructed by a letter from the Chairman to forward the Multigraph to Mr. Grimke, who would examine it to see if it could be used, or whether it had better be disposed.

The Chairman, said that due to an unpleasant incident involving a Member of the Society, the Society and a non-member into a three cornered argument, in the future, isll questions as to policies brought up for discussion would be treated as confidential, and that any breaches of confidences would be stringently dealt with. It was also stated by Mr. Claudius, and two others that when questions came up involving the Society, names would be brought out into the open, and that after the matter had been adjusted satisfactorily to all concerned, the matter would be closed, and not brought up.

A Recess was declared. After this Recess, Proved, a moving picture of the General Motors Proving Grounds was shown.

Messrs Habl and Brownstein were awarded the Workmanship Medal for September.

It was officially announced that the Annual Exhibition will be held from December 16th to 21st., Inclusive at the Knickerbooker Building.

The Awards for the Competitions for the Exhibition were announced. Er, Cotillieard asked what was permissable to offer as an award so as to clear up the situation.

The Meeting adjourned at 10.30 P. M. with 37 members present and 7 guests and visitors.
